The Texas Retired Teachers Foundation (TRTF) knows that educators matter! We are focused on how we can make public education in our great state better in every way. As educators, we know the work we do changes lives, and every day is an opportunity to impact the future!

While TRTF enjoys sharing stories about those whom your donations have helped, we also want to share with you how our organization is focused on the future and how your generosity continues to shape education even if you are no longer in the classroom each day.

This year, TRTF embarks on two new journeys while staying on a path to help educators of the past, present and future.

Beginning Teacher Scholarships: Helping New Educators Get a Head Start!

In years past, TRTF has given funds to students pursuing degrees in education. After considerable discussion, TRTF is replacing its Student Scholarship program – which gave funds to high school seniors and college students – to create a new program that rewards students who have completed college and will enter the classroom as professional educators for the first time. The Beginning Teacher Scholarship will reimburse applicants for certification tests, and provide funds to help the applicant purchase materials for his or her classroom during his or her first year of teaching.

TRTF will award ten \$750 scholarships for the 2017–2018 school year to applicants who are relatives of an active member of TRTA, have earned or are earning a degree in education at a Texas university or college, and have pursued or are pursuing their teaching certification exam, all in anticipation of beginning their teaching career during the fall of 2017 or spring of 2018. The names of our first 10 recipients will be announced at the 2017 TRTA Convention during the Foundation breakfast in March.

We need your help promoting this program to upcoming and recent college graduates! Funding our Most Needed Program, Now and in the Future

You may have read in the second quarter issue of *The VOICE* about our efforts to continue providing emergency assistance to Texas public education retirees with critical needs. TRTF started "A Helping Hand" in 2010, and has given over \$90,000 to 93 retirees since that time!

Our recipients are people you may know, but may not hear about. A couple of months ago, TRTF helped a member of TRTA pay for her Medicare premium. Access to affordable health care is vital to retirees, and without this payment, this member would not have been able to continue to receive medical care.



Your donations also helped a retiree purchase hearing aids this year, which she has needed for two and half years!

Another retiree who is paralyzed and confined to a wheelchair struggles to pay for daily medical services. She was able to receive assistance with her automobile insurance and mortgage payments. Now that she is caught up on bills, she receives the daily treatment she needs!

There are many public education retirees in Texas – especially those who earn \$1000 or less per month (105,000 retirees statewide) – who are in need of emergency financial assistance. Perhaps their home was damaged after a recent flood, or high summer utility bills prevent them from affording food.

You may know someone who could use a helping hand right now! Please reach out to the Foundation, as our organization may be able to provide more than financial assistance, but also relief, comfort and the ability for a retiree to get back on his or her feet.

When you donate to "A Helping Hand," you are helping a fellow retiree resolve a problem that could have left them without a place to live or unable see their doctor. This year, TRTA celebrates the 25th

anniversary of the "CPI Catch–Up," a significant legislative change that enabled Texas public education retirees to receive permanent benefit increases to make up for losses due to the high inflation rates of the 1980s. By 1999, retiree benefits had been fully adjusted for inflation and were ahead of inflation by 10 percent. By 2001, adjusted benefits exceeded inflation by 15 percent!

The total value to all current and future retirees for the initiative equaled \$14.8 billion. All current and future retirees on average receive an extra \$300 per month as a result, impacting the future retirement income of hundreds of thousands of dedicated public education employees.

How does all of this impact the future of "A Helping Hand?" Today, TRS retirees live on an average fixed income of \$1900, and approximately 80 percent do not receive Social Security benefits. The path for significant benefit increases going forward is very difficult. As TRTF looks to the future, we know many more retirees will need assistance as the purchasing power of fixed annuities is eaten away by inflation.

As a result, TRTF has established the Lehr–Pritchard Endowment Fund. The fund will continue the work of two of the Foundation's most iconic, important figures, Mike Lehr and Tom Pritchard.

Lehr served as the Executive Director of TRTA from 1994 to 2003, spearheading the "CPI Catch-Up" strategy. He also served on TRTF's Board of Trustees until 2015. Pritchard was TRTA's President from 2002 to 2004. Subsequently, he became the President of TRTF and served in this position until 2015.

The endowment fund will solidify and expand the "A Helping Hand" program, which Lehr and Pritchard fostered to success. The goal is to reach \$2 million in donations by December 31, 2019. Donations will be invested and the earnings will be used to fund "A Helping Hand" indefinitely.

Impacting Classrooms Every Day

Today's classroom teachers use a variety of tools to educate children, but due to lack of sufficient funding, many find new technology items out of reach. TRTF's Classroom Assistance Grant program helps teachers improve the learning environment for students by giving \$500 towards projects, learning platforms, software, and much more. Since 2008, TRTF has provided \$56,000 in grants to active educators all across Texas.

Donna Magjarevich, a dyslexia teacher at Selman Intermediate in Sealy, says that "the state of Texas mandates that a school district have a dyslexia program...but it does not allot any funding for this service." In 2016, she won a \$500 grant from TRTF, using the money to purchase Really Great Reading Phonics. The program provides a set of tools to diagnose, group, and teach students with weaknesses in their foundational reading skills.

Donna feels the program is ideal for students growing up in a technological

age, and is excited that her school's dyslexia program will be updated for the first time in 20 years. Her students will not only improve their reading accuracy and rate, but also their use of electronic mediums to communicate.

Joel Yelton, an Industrial Technology teacher at Cypress Ridge High School in Houston, also won a grant. Mr. Yelton and his students will use the \$500 to purchase materials to build a tiny house. Mr. Yelton is no stranger to taking on ambitious projects, such as building custom cars, and finds that combining "theories and concepts with real world applications" gives relevancy to his students' education.

"Harder, more complex projects give my students a real sense of purpose," says Joel. With 65 percent of students at Cypress Ridge qualifying for free and reduced lunch, he acknowledges that many experience financial distress. "I believe that my job is to give them the most I can with whatever materials I have." He also wants the lessons they learn to be twofold, especially when it concerns the value of time and money: "there are people out there who are willing to help, but inevitably we make our own way."

Laura Vrana teaches first grade at Jefferson Avenue Elementary in Seguin. Like most schools that receive grants from TRTF, Jefferson is a Title I school. Laura says "the school is always looking for new ways to encourage and provide opportunities to enhance academic achievement among these disadvantaged children. A strong academic foundation goes hand-in-hand with a strong social and emotional one."

The Jefferson Garden Club is one result of this philosophy, and Ms. Vrana has seen how participation in the club teaches responsibility, organizational skills and persistence. The students learn about nutrition, where food comes from and how to care for their environment, all important facets of their well-being now and in the future. The club exceeds 90 students in grades one through five. Laura was able to purchase fruit trees, rose bushes, seeds and soil for this year's spring garden.

TRTF will continue to support current classroom teachers by providing fifteen \$500 grants for innovative projects and learning platforms in the coming year. Your donations help students develop real-world skills, and provides them with a caring, creative community to explore their future!

Proposed Bylaws Amendments: Due November 1

Article XV, Section 1 of the TRTA bylaws states that "proposed amendments to be considered by the Organizational Affairs Committee shall be made through a Local Unit or a TRTA District and shall be submitted to the TRTA office by November 1, 2016." Download the bylaws amendment form at www.trta.org. Please attach a copy of the District or Local Unit meeting minutes during which the proposed bylaws amendment was passed.

Reports for the Children's Book Project, Volunteer Hours, Health Care, Retirement Events, Scholarship and Grants: Due February 15 and March 1

Local unit reports are due to the District Committee Chairman by February 15, 2017. District reports are due to the State Committee Representative by March 1, 2017.

Delegate Information: Due February 27

Names of all convention delegates are due in the TRTA office by February 27, 2017. Information and forms will be mailed to District and Local Unit Presidents in December. Changes to TRS–Care Adopted by TRS Board of Trustees; Cost Increases in Store for TRS–Care

As TRTA reported in the second quarter issue of *The VOICE*, The Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) Board of Trustees met in June to discuss approving several changes to the TRS–Care retiree health insurance program. Those changes were accepted and are going into effect this month, September 2016. It is the first time in 12 years that TRS has introduced a cost increase for participants of TRS–Care.

These changes include: increased deductibles; increased out-of-pocket maximum costs; new convenience fees for local pharmacy prescription drug fills; and new rules on Medicare D. The plan changes are projected to cost TRS-Care participants more than \$43 million.

TRTA learned in May that TRS-Care is facing an imminent negative balance of approximately \$18 million by August 2017. At the time, TRS Executive Director Brian Guthrie could not say that the balance would increase or decrease in the coming months. TRTA then learned in June that the negative balance has changed to a small surplus of approximately \$13 million. While this may seem like good news, \$13 million covers only two to three days of claims. TRS determined that it must have more money in its end of year cash flow for claims due to the rapid fluctuations and unpredictability of medical costs. This increasing financial pressure caused the TRS Board to take immediate action.

In May, Director Guthrie stressed that the only opportunity to help prevent a negative fund balance is now, as waiting until 2017 to enact any changes is not enough time to have an effect. He also stressed that there is no guarantee of receiving supplemental funding from the Legislature during the 85th Legislative Session. Mitigating the shortfall using methods that are within the purview of the Board of Trustees—actions not requiring legislative approval—had to be considered sooner rather than later.

As our members know, the program faces a much bigger shortfall for the coming legislative session than it faced in 2015. Last session, the Texas Legislature approved supplemental funding in the amount of \$768 million for TRS–Care, intending to prevent massive premium increases for retirees living on fixed incomes. While much needed and appreciated, the funding was a temporary fix. TRS–Care is now projected to have a shortfall between \$1.5 and \$2 billion for the 2017–18 fiscal year!

TRS–Care Changes and How They Affect

Your Pocketbook Among the changes, TRS is introducing Humana as a new Medicare Advantage provider. This change will go into effect January 1, 2017. Humana will be in attendance at several TRTA district fall conventions and will host seminars this fall to discuss information with plan participants, such as providers available through their network. Stay tuned to the *Inside Line* for dates and times of these seminars!

For those who do not have the Medicare Advantage Plan, Aetna will remain as the traditional Medicare provider.

Express Scripts will continue to manage pharmacy benefits. The TRS staff recommended that there be no increase in retiree premium contributions.

Changes in Medical Deductibles and Out-of-Pocket Costs (Expected Cost to Retirees, \$21.9 million) TRS is increasing medical deductibles and maximum out-ofpocket limits within grandfathering limits, as well as increasing pharmacy copays within grandfathering limits. Changes in Medicare D and Pharmacy Co-Pays (Projected Savings and Cost to Potigrae, \$17.8 million) Effective

to Retirees, \$17.8 million) Effective January 1, 2017, the prescription drug plan for Medicare eligible members will be the Medicare Part D plan, with those who do not have either Part A or Part B remaining in the traditional plan. There will be no change to the current pharmacy co-pays on the Medicare Part D plan. A \$10 convenience fee after the first fill for maintenance drugs dispensed at a retail pharmacy will be instated in order to create an incentive for members to utilize mail



order for their prescriptions.

When Will These Changes Take Place?

The changes adopted by the TRS Board of Trustees go into effect on September 1, 2016 (excepting the change to Humana for Medicare Advantage, which will take place on January 1, 2017).

What can TRTA members do to protect

their vital health care benefits? Encourage others to join our fight and support TRTA. Our membership exceeds 80,000, but there are more than 250,000 people in TRS–Care! If all 250,000 participants united with TRTA, we would stand a much better chance at funding this program adequately now and in the future.

It takes hard work and a consistent effort to tell our story. It takes dedicated members willing to call and email their elected officials and let them know our TRS–Care program is in dire circumstances.


TRTA members must recognize that the battle for health care funding will be very difficult. We have many friends in the Legislature, but many are saying that fewer dollars will be available. TRTA is a successful advocacy organization because we find ways to work with all of our elected officials.

The fight for more funding for the TRS–Care plan is already underway. The Legislature must take a comprehensive look at how they fund this vital retiree health care program.

The decisions made this summer may be viewed as a modest reduction in benefits for retirees; however, if the Legislature does not act to deal with this health care crisis, TRS– Care plan design and premium increases may make the plan unrecognizable compared to how we know it today. ►

Revitalizing Local Units by Bridging the Gap with Active Educators

TRTA has said many times over the years that our 250-plus local units are the heart of our great organization, doing the grassroots advocacy work necessary to make the voices of thousands of public education retirees a unified force in the Texas Legislature and beyond.

As we all continue building this voice, we must show active educators that we care about more than just retirement issues. They are vital to building the future of both our state and local organizations!

That being said, the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) serves as a great unifier – whether you are retired or still actively employed, you are participating by making contributions and are helping to build the promise that the TRS system will be there for all retirees and pre-retirees when needed. This is a great message and a good way to start a conversation with folks who may not even know they are contributing, much less what the promise entails for them!

Our job as members is to remind actives that we are focused on maintaining that promise through issue advocacy in the Legislature, voting for public officials who will keep the promise, and remaining vigilant about potential changes and communicating them to all who will listen.

Active educators are our allies! We work to protect their future retirement benefits, and we need their support as well. We need them to join together with us and participate in the fight to keep the promise!

Many of our members already reach out to active educators through volunteering at schools, providing support to teachers as the school year begins, giving books to students, and so much more. Our members are sincere in their efforts because they have all been there! This demonstration of support means a lot to active educators, and makes our organization meaningful to them. Hopefully, they think of us when they begin to focus their energies on retirement and will join our organization and become future leaders for TRTA.

Below are some additional ideas on how you can help your local unit bridge the gap and provide encouragement to our active educator allies!

Civic participation and political involvement

We all know how important it is to vote in all elections, and we should also share information we learn about political candidates with active educators, such as where a candidate stands on various educational, health care and retirement security issues. Above all, though active educators lead very busy lives, we must stress to them the importance and the power of their vote!

TRTA is a part of the Texas Educators Vote coalition with multiple active educator organizations. Please consider becoming a local coalition representative and volunteer along with likeminded pre-retirees on each campus to encourage teachers to register to vote, be informed voters and vote at every opportunity! If you are interested in becoming a coalition volunteer or campus representative, please email Brock Gregg at brock@trta.org.

Work with the coalition to get educators to sign a pledge to vote and to pass a school board resolution (available through the coalition website) to encourage an attitude of civic engagement. Texas Educators Vote has a website (www.texaseducatorsvote.com) and Facebook page with more information.

Your local unit can also build partnerships with local civic groups, such as the League of Women Voters, PTA/ PTO, school bond election campaigns, and active educator organizations representing teachers and administrators. Consider participating in active educator meetings, and invite their leaders and members to attend TRTA meetings so that information can be shared about how we can work together. Being present is key to building trust! It does not require a huge commitment of time and is very rewarding.

Reaching out to active teachers in the schools

Active educators deserve our respect and sincere support of their service to the public and to school children. There are many ways TRTA members can show that we care.

Our members serve on school district committees, deliver goodies to schools, and even distribute copies of *The VOICE*. Consider working these activities into your current governance structure using your legislative, community volunteer service, and retirement education committees, as well as through the Children's Book Project and local unit scholarship programs. You can also offer opportunities to active teachers through the Texas Retired Teachers Foundation (TRTF) by sharing applications for classroom assistance grants and the new beginning teacher scholarships. Some other simple but highly effective ideas include volunteering for school UIL activities and science fairs.

TRTA is developing a great new resource that will be available to all members. This volunteer portal will connect schools with retired educators for the purpose of volunteering. Active educators may post volunteer opportunities, request specific education needs and review volunteer hours. Retired educators may join posted events, record their volunteer hours and provide feedback on their volunteer experience.

Please stay tuned to learn more about this wonderful, free volunteer portal that will help TRTA assist more active teachers statewide! Contact Brock Gregg to sign up your local unit to connect with volunteer opportunities in your school district.

Social media networking!

Collect personal contact information for pre-retirees, especially email addresses. Active educators may appreciate receiving free TRTA resources such as the *Inside Line* and Before the Bell enewsletters. Offer to put educators on these lists to receive frequent legislative and education updates. Send their names and email addresses along with their school district to brock@trta.org, and TRTA will sign them up! Encourage them to like our TRTA and Before the Bell Facebook pages for daily updates.

You can also send support emails and newsletters from your local unit about any upcoming events or meetings that they may be interested in attending. Some local units, for example, host meal events honoring local teachers and often receive many new members this way.

Consider sending actives in your area an email when TRTA releases a new video on our YouTube channel, TRTATV, or when Tim Lee sends out an *Inside Line* with an urgent action alert requesting that members contact their legislators. Remind active educators that retirement issues being reviewed by the Texas Legislature impact their future financial security as well!

If you haven't already done so, create a local unit Facebook page. Many of today's teachers use Facebook to read news, get ideas for their classroom, and participate in groups to discuss curriculum and lesson planning. Since many already use Facebook as a source of information, your local unit page can serve as another source with information about the Legislature, voting, and retirement.

While these are just a few of many ideas for connecting your local unit with active teachers, they are all vital activities for growing your membership and creating a path for the future. Power in the public



sphere depends upon the size of the voice (voters), the commitment to core principles (the TRS promise), and the resources we are willing to expend toward our core principles (what we are willing to do as individuals and a unified group to keep that commitment). We must work hard, together, to protect what we all believe in!

District Presidents Leadership Training Conference Held in Austin

TRTA's district presidents met in Austin July 11–15 for their annual District Presidents Leadership Training Conference (DPLTC). The 20 district presidents arrived from all across the state to receive comprehensive training from the TRTA Board of Directors about their manifold roles and responsibilities as leaders in the organization.

The conference served as an opportunity for all continuing and incoming district presidents to become acquainted with one another. One of the primary focuses of the conference was to prepare presidents for the challenges to come in 2017 during the 85th Legislative Session, particularly for TRS–Care.

As many of our members know, the Legislature has formed an interim study group to assess the health care program between now and the beginning of the 85th Legislative Session. A report is expected from that committee this fall. District presidents serve as vital connections between the state office and the organization's 254 local units, helping to rally the organization's membership to participate in meetings of the study group and contact their legislators before and during session.

Along with new initiatives, district presidents gleaned and learned how to disseminate information from state level committees to their district and local unit counterparts. Facilitating the work of the health care, retirement education, community and volunteer service, informative and protective services, member benefits, organizational affairs, and local unit support committees is a key role for a TRTA district president.

The presidents also elected their District Presidents Council, three representatives who serve on the TRTA Board of Directors. Council Chairman is June Cooper of District 17, Vice–Chairman is Ella Gauthier of District 4 and Recorder is Lynn Granzin of District 15.

The presidents returned home excited to face the challenges of the coming year. TRTA is grateful for the active participation of our district leaders and looks forward to working with them to make our association vocal, cohesive, and stronger than ever!
